Tourist itinerary

Through the secular "quintas" (manor houses) of Santo António da Serra | 8,80km

The occupation of this village is closely related to the summer villas of wealthy families of Funchal, especially those of English origin, who sought here a warmer refuge in the summer months. This route, which will take you to know the location of many of these villas, has as its starting point Santo da Serra Square, in the heart of town, in front of the

- 1. Church Igreja de Santo António, from the mid-nineteenth century, with its blue and white neobaroque panels in the main chapel, built at the expense of public funds while the body of the church was built thanks to the valuable contribution of the American consul João Howard March; outside the fence of the church yard, a partition plate is deployed
- 2. County partitions Standard Padrão Divisório de Concelho between Santa Cruz and Machico, with heraldic representation of both, strife symbol between the two councils from 1835-1862; in this year the dividing line was finally fixed. Here you can also observe
- 3. the fountain Fontanário. Follow the
- Regional Road Santo António da Serra (E.R. 207) towards Santa Cruz, going through
- 5. the villa Quinta do Santo da Serra or Junta summer residence of the President of the Regional Government, the property is free public access and was once vacation home of the English family Blandy. The building of the nineteenth century, built according the British colonial taste, shows characteristic windows with lintel curve; the property has a magnificent tree park with boxwood gardens, groves of Azaleas, where plants from around the world live, as the gray palm trees, spruce trees, camellias, tree ferns, rhododendrons, endemic tildes, etc. At the eastern end of the park there is a gazebo with a beautiful view of the wide valley of Machico. In this large garden you can do maintenance, eat lunch, or simply experience the stillness and beauty of nature. A little further on, on the right side of the course, it is worth visiting the
- **6.** Hotel Porto Bay Serra Golf. The main building, dated 1920, was restored in 1999 and its facade translates decorative elements of the Art Nouveau era, such as crimping flowering tiles, white slatted wooden windows and its roof scales; the expansion of this Chalet, former summer residence, later Teahouse and subsequently Golf Club, which was designed by architect Rui Campos Matos. Continue the route to the
- Golf Course Campo de Golfe; around the roundabout, go ahead, and enter on the right in the path
- 8. Caminho do Poiso; on the right, after passing the Tourist Resort of
- 9. Quinta da Cova do Milho, take the
- 10. bystreet Travessa do Poiso, leading down to become a pathway
- 11. Vereda (of Travessa do Poiso); carry on downhill, through
- **12. Blandy Estate Quinta Blandy** (one of several properties of this British family, that is a reference in the history and Madeira wine trade for over two centuries, not only in Madeira but also all over the world) until the water channel
- 13. Levada Nova de Santa Cruz, following to the right (opposite to the water).
 When you reach the river
- 14. Ribeira de Santa Cruz, cross over and go up by the pathway
- **15.** Vereda do Alvoredo, stepping through an area of laurel forest with dense vegetation (laurel and tilde) and some ruins (haystacks) until
- **16.** Levada dos Tornos; take the opposite direction to the water and continue towards the
- 17. road Caminho da Madre de Água, starting to climb to the
- 18. School ARENDRUP; here you can visit the
- 19. Chapel of the Sisters Pereira Capela das Irmãs da Pereira, the place where an English nun Mary Jane Wilson lived and founded a school, in the late nineteenth century, major character with great charitable action almost everywhere east of the island. Go back to the route through the street called
- 20. Rua Mary Jane Wilson up until
- 21. the estate Quinta do Serrado das Ameixieiras or Quinta

Acciaiolli; descending the path

- **22.** Caminho do Serrado das Ameixieiras and meet a small but interesting core of traditional houses, with its gardened and cultivated surroundings. Retake the crossing with Mary Jane Wilson Street and turn right at
- 23. Pereira path Caminho da Pereira towards Santo da Serra; at about 400 meters you can make a small detour to the
- 24. Nascent Acciaiolli Nascentes Acciaiolli, an ancient water reservoir that even supplied the entire town of Santa Cruz, and that is also an interesting Geocaching point. Go back to Caminho da Pereira Pereira Way, passing through the crossroad with Caminho dos Rochões and further on the Tourist Resort of
- 25. Quinta das Eiras. This territory is still populated with villas / farms, some with large areas of land with beautiful specimens of trees, such as
- **26.** Quinta Valente, a private property where you can see a giant eucalyptus exemplary ranked as one of the 203 'Monumental and Emblematic trees of Madeira' (publication of the Regional Forest Department DRF). Just opposite, on the right side of the road, we can see another villa, an estate of contemporary language, a project of the Architect Paulo David. Keep going until the end of the Rua Pereira (Pereira Road) to the intersection with
- **27.** Rua Padre João Pedro Gomes Henriques and turn right. About 50 meters ahead, to the right, go down the stairs, paved with sharp stones, to access the
- 28. Fountain Fonte do Bispo ou dos Ingleses of late-Mannerist language, in stonework, dating from the XVIII century, with wide ranging in round arch and semicircular inside domed; the dual place name in the source originates from the summer residence of the bishop of Funchal that had nearby and from the presence of many English names that are recorded in the source of the backrests; names of British who inhabited in the villas in Santo da Serra, of summer visitors and British soldiers who occupied Madeira between 1807 and 1814, following the Napoleonic invasions of Portugal. Continue to head to the crossing with the road
- 29. Santo António da Serra regional road (E.R. 207) and turn right. Go through the short distance to
- 30. the Square Largo do Santo da Serra where you started this route.

Make sure you try the traditional Sidra – a beverage made from fermented juice of Santo da Serra apple (also known as the Holy fiddle Pêro).
